

History of the Ohara Institute

• The Ohara Institute for Social Research, founded in 1919, is one of the oldest research institutes in the fields of social science in Japan.



 The institute took its name from its founder, Magosaburo Ohara, a wealthy industrialist from Kurashiki, Okayama Prefecture.

History of the Ohara Institute

- In 1949, the institute became affiliated with Hosei University.
- In 1986, the Institute changed its status from an independent foundation to an integral part of Hosei University and moved from the Fujimi campus (at the center of Tokyo) to the university's new Tama campus (in the western surburbs of Tokyo).




